Context

National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) Applied Research Collaboration (ARC) North Thames is offering an internship in dementia research, as part of a national NIHR ARC initiative to support people interested in developing a career in dementia research. This is an exciting opportunity to work closely with, and learn from, experienced dementia researchers in an academic research setting. Interns will have access to the programme of training and events offered by the ARC North Thames Academy, in addition to training opportunities provided by their host departments.

Applicants should have at least a BA/BSc in a social science degree (MA/MSc are preferrable), an interest/experience in social care and dementia, and experience in qualitative research methods. The internship is available any time from 15 May 2025, working one-two days/week for approximately six months (or an alternative equivalent duration). The post will be based in the Research Department of Primary Care and Population Health and the intern is expected to work on site.

NIHR ARC North Thames

NIHR ARC North Thames is a partnership of over 40 organisations from across North Central and Northeast London, Essex, Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire. These organisations include leading universities, the NHS, councils, patients, communities, charities and industry who share a commitment to improving health and social care services, and people's health. Working together, we identify the key health and care problems facing organisations in our partnership, design innovative research in response and rapidly put findings into practice across our region and beyond.

Study Details: [Intern] (PI: Dr. Claudio Di Lorito).

People with dementia can live alone successfully even when they do not have support from family or friends. However, they can find it difficult to find out about, start using and continue to use social care services that might help them to live at home for as long as possible. As a result, they risk not getting the care that they need when they need it, experience safety issues in their homes, and have to move out of their homes sooner than expected.

This new study is entitled Promoting uptake and continued use of social care services in people with dementia who live alone and have no informal support (SoCeeD). It aims to identify examples of support that help people with dementia who live alone and have no support from family or friends to access and use social services. The study is ongoing (started June 2024). We are interviewing people from support services to find out how they helped and people with dementia who got that help to tell us about their experience. In doing so, we will find out what has worked and what can be improved. We will also speak to people with dementia who have not taken up social care services to understand why.

We will use this information to understand different types of support, what seems to work, what needs improving and what is not working. We will then write recommendations for support services about how to best help people who live alone and do not have support from family and friends to access and use social care services.

The postholder will be part of the study team and work closely with the PI in analysing interview data, writing-up findings for publications and preparing the final report, as well as other dissemination events.

Learning and development opportunity

The intern will gain:

- Qualitative analysis skills
- Academic writing skills (e.g., peer-review publications)
- Experience in working directly with the PI on dementia research
- Interpersonal and communication skills
- An opportunity to develop their own research ideas in this area.

Duties and responsibilities

- Conduct qualitative data analysis
- Contribute to writing reports, peer-reviewed publications, and other outputs
- Ensure all research management/approvals (e.g. ethical, governance, data sharing) are followed
- Ensure confidentiality on all matters and information obtained.

Other duties

- General administrative duties including setting-up meetings, preparing agendas and minute-taking
- Co-ordinate own work with others to avoid conflict or duplication
